Noah and Jonah – Two stories that collide

It is fun when reading your Bible to come across connec-
tions you never noticed before. This week while I was
preparing for the sermon, I read about two different ancient accounts of
the flood that were recorded in ancient Mesopotamia. These accounts of
the flood had different purposes. One account was a guy who wanted to
find immortality and it came through finding the one who survived the
ancient flood. The other story is about how the “gods” didn't like all the
noise humanity was making so they sent a great flood to wipe them out.

Honestly, they are pretty odd stories. What is fun is this... both of
these ancient stories were found in the ruins of the great library of
Ashurbanipal in Nineveh by Hormuzd Rassam in 1853. These stories
date back to 1630 BC.

Here is where it gets to be interesting from a Biblical standpoint – Jonah
went to what city to preach repentance to them? Yep, Nineveh. When
did he go? 8th Century BC.

See where I'm going? Jonah was saved from the waters of drowning by
a great fish, which carried him through the ocean and spit him up on the
shore of Nineveh. Right to the place where these other stories of the
flood were held. The same waters that brought death and judgement to
humanity in the past were the waters that Jonah was delivered from to
bring a message to a people that he did not consider worthy. Jonah
wanted to see the people destroyed by God. But God wanted Jonah to
bring a message of warning to them.

The people of Nineveh would have had these old flood stories to relate
to. Jonah could have referenced these in bringing the news of God's
grace to these people and reminded them of the flood in the past. They
could have been a great tool used to bring the truth of Yahweh's presence
into a culture that did not know nor worship Yahweh.

It makes me wonder, are there stories or experiences around us today
that would help us to bring God's message of salvation by Christ to the
world in which we now live? Maybe, rather than trying to run away like
Jonah, we need to see the opportunities to share God's message with
those who are lost around us. Maybe we should stretch our thinking a
little and see how God is revealing himself in these days.

A Note from Kendra Tylee on a New Mission.

Hello Apple River Community Church. As many of you know, I went to Maui, Hawaii in January of 2020 to be part of Youth With A Mission (YWAM). I was supposed to be there for discipleship training for 3 months and then go to another country to evangelize for an additional 3 months. However, due to Covid19 we were all sent home early. Our outreach was not canceled at the time, just postponed, and was going to look a little different. Eventually our leaders came up with an outreach idea that would take place here in the states. At the time I did not feel called to be part of that particular outreach nor did many of my other classmates. My friends from other countries were not able to be part of this outreach either.

When I came back home, I enjoyed my time with my family. I started working at Dizzy Jay, my neighbor’s horse ranch, across the road. It is my favorite thing to do - work with kids and horses! I have also been working as a CNA at Golden Age Manor.

A few weeks ago, my mom heard a podcast on Focus on the Family featuring Kim Meeder who founded Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch in Bend, Oregon. It is a Christian ranch that works with broken families and kids that are at risk. My mom sent me a link and I checked it out. They take on interns to be mentors and ranch hands. I felt called to consider this ministry and decided to put in an application. I received an acceptance shortly after! So, I will be moving to Bend, Oregon the end of February to work at the ranch for 3 months. I am considering this to be an outreach because it is a place where they work with sharing the love of Jesus with the kids and families that come through the program.

I am really looking forward to working there and being part of the team that gets to share the good news of Jesus! I am once again going to try and post updates on my Facebook page if you would like to follow and see my journey to and in Oregon:)
