What Would You Do Differently?

It is no surprise that the fall of 2020 has brought a resurgence of the virus that left us quarantined in the spring of the year. The trajectory of the outbreaks has many talking about shutting down and quarantining again.

For some, the spring shutdown was a welcome break from a busy life. For others it felt like a violation of the freedom held so sacred. **Still others are still fearful of the virus and haven't come out of isolation yet.** Whichever side you are on, the question is still relevant, **"what would you do differently if the state shutdown again?"** It might not be this fall. It might not be until 2021. It might not happen until the next election in 2024; but it probably will shut down again some-time. Or, at the least, your life will shut down for a period of time due to personal illness, loss or difficulty. So, what did you learn and how would you handle it differently?

Let me give you a few things to consider.

A quiet time away from public interaction gives a person ample time to reflect and grow. In Mark 1, we see Jesus taking the time to get up in the morning to draw away from others to a solitary place to pray to the Father. Jesus models this through his ministry, taking time away. He went away for 40 days and 40 nights to spend time in fasting and prayer. Jesus used these times alone to grow. He used these quiet times to prepare for ministry in the future. You would have to say from scripture that God ordained these brief shutdowns for the development of His Son.

When was the last time you read a book? Many of us have treated **education like we would obtaining a driver's license. We fulfilled the requirements and have no desire to develop our minds any further.** But great men and women of the past continued to learn through their lives. The apostle Paul is an example. He was a very learned man when he experienced Christ on the Damascus road. What many of us fail to realize is that Paul spent 3 years studying Christ and the scriptures while in Arabia before he began preaching. It was some 11-13 years later that he embarked on his missionary journeys after spending time honing his craft among the disciples. Learning and growing is something we are to do throughout our lives. Proverbs 25:2 says, **"It is the glory of God to conceal a thing, but the honor of**

kings to search out a matter.” Are you searching out matters in life? Are you searching out what matters in life?

Did the time of shutdown draw you closer to your family or push them further away? Why did that happen? Ephesians 4:3 gives us the encouragement to keep unity of the Spirit and preserve the bond of peace. This is true for our church and our families as much as it is in our control. Ephesians 6 gives us two great directives. First, children should honor their mother and father. Second, that parents should not exasperate their children. The world sees Christ in us as they witness Christ in our families.

When a shutdown happens again in our lives, we have a choice to make. We can get angry and upset. We can peddle our thoughts through the internet like an independent snake-oil sales representative covering the country; or we can take the time to draw near to God and grow spiritually. We can learn from what we went through and be wise about the days we have. What would you do differently?

November Missions of the Month — **Radio Bible Class (RBC) and Samaritan’s Purse**

RBC Ministries was started in 1956 in Grand Rapids, Michigan. They provide free non-denominational literature as well as radio and podcast programs. Our daily Bread is their daily devotional booklet. Millions of copies are sent to over 100 countries. We have them in our entryway. You are encouraged to take them and use them yourself or give as a witness to others.

Samaritan’s Purse was started to fulfill the lessons learned from the Bible story of “The Good Samaritan”. A Samaritan man had compassion on a beaten traveler and stopped to bind up his wounds. Franklin Graham is the president. He started the organization in 1979.

Thousands of volunteers work in over 100 countries to minister to needs of people. Some of the areas of ministry include:

1. Natural disaster clean up and rebuilding
2. Help persecuted Christians
3. Proclaim the Gospel.
4. Hold prayer rallies for the U.S.A.
5. Heart and cleft palate surgeries
6. Christmas shoe boxes for children.
7. Feed refugees
8. Dig wells for clean water.
9. Provide urgent medical care including COVID-19
10. Send animals, bees, tools and sewing machines to help people earn a living.

Solitude as soul care

Richard J. Foster (*Celebration of Discipline*) says solitude is “more a state of mind and heart” than a place: “There is a solitude of the heart that can be maintained at all times. Crowds, or the lack of them, have little to do with this inward attentiveness.”

Although Jesus preferred crowd-free alone times, that’s not always feasible. But no matter your surroundings and responsibilities, you can carve out intentional time to “be still” (Psalm 46:10). Try these tips for adding solitude to life’s rhythms:

- **Take a day.** Every month or two, enjoy a day of solitude. Turn off your phone and spend the day with God.
- **Take an hour.** Treat this time as an important calendar appointment. Keep it free to protect your solitude.
- **Take a minute.** Before a big meeting or as you’re answering the phone, breathe deeply and invite God into the moment.
