To fear or not to fear? That is the question.

I often write these articles after reflecting upon a conversation from earlier in the month. This past month I was visiting with a gentleman who asked about the condition of our church. I said, "We are doing well and living without fear." He retorted that it is good for us to be afraid. "Fear keeps us alive and helps us avoid doing stupid things," he stated.

I admit that I have not considered it good for us to be afraid. His words shocked me a little. I disagreed in my mind but chose to not argue about it. After a few weeks of reflecting on it, I wanted to share with you some thoughts.

Yes, there are some natural fears that help preserve life. I don't touch a glowing hot stove for I fear being burned. I make sure my ladder is firmly on the ground before climbing it. I test electrical circuits before start working on them. In a little way, I have a healthy respect and fear of these items. Fear, by definition, is the action of being afraid of something that is likely to be dangerous, painful or threatening. It is similar to terror, alarm, or nervousness.

In the Old Testament, the people of God are told to "Fear not, for I (Yahweh) am the one who helps you." (Isaiah 41:13) Or, Joshua 1:9 where the Israelites, who are about to go into the promised land and face a difficult enemy, are encouraged with, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

There is a principle: though it would make sense to have fear and there would be reason for fear, we don't fear because Yahweh moves on our behalf. When I work on outlets, I turn the power off. I've been shocked before and it is not pleasant. I have a healthy 'fear' of the outlet. But when I recognize that I have access to the control of the outlet (the fuse box) and appeal to the fuse box to shut the power off to the outlet, I don't need to fear any longer. The same is true when we face difficulty. Our appeal is to the one who has control over the situation, and after making our appeal, we rely upon him for the outcome. Then, we don't need to fear. Yahweh is the One who is greater than the situation we face. It doesn't excuse the personal responsibility to do all you can do first, but there must be a reliance upon Yahweh.

To fear or not to fear? That is the question.

Jesus brings this concept up in the New Testament as well. Matthew 6:25-26 teaches **“Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?”**

Jesus replaces the concept of “fear” with that of “anxiety.” In doing so, he elevates the detail of the concerns God has for us. Yahweh is able to handle not just the fearful circumstance, but also the small details that cause us to be anxious.

So, the BASIC principle of scripture is that we should not fear nor be anxious about difficulties that exist in the world around us.

BUT, sometimes we just stop there. That can be a problem. For if we stop there it would lead us to walk around like ignorant children playing on the ledge of a cliff. **Some Christians say, “I should not fear; therefore, I’m going to do whatever I want without thought of consequence.” Proverbs 27:12 says, “The prudent see danger and take refuge, but the simple keep going and pay the penalty.” It is repeated in Proverbs 22:3. Again, to the outlet, I don’t fear the outlet, but I make sure to exercise wisdom and prudence around the outlet.**

We shouldn’t stop at the “basic” understanding of fear, but develop the full understanding: we should not fear nor be anxious about difficulties that exist in the world around us BECAUSE we have a GOD who helps take care of us. Our faith is not the absence of fear nor the removal of situations, rather our faith is our trust in Yahweh in the midst of the fear and difficulties. As we use the minds He has given us to walk through tough times, we can also trust He will preserve us.


So, for you, what are you fearing? What is causing you anxiety? How can you trust the object of your faith (God) and walk wisely with Him through the challenges before you? The difficulty might be used by Him to prepare you for greater ministry in the future. The thing you are afraid of might temper your **character so that you resemble Christ more. Be wise. Be faithful. Don’t be afraid.**

May Mission of the Month — CHILDREN'S HAVEN INTERNATIONAL. PHARR, TEXAS

Children's Haven International is located on our southern border. The headquarters are in Pharr, Texas and the children's home is in Reynosa, Mexico. Their purpose is to care for orphans and teach them academics and biblical training. They also run a thrift store to raise funds.

Lee and Shirley Mendoza started the orphanage in the 70's. They house over 50 children and more come in just for schooling. It was originally started by the Mennonites, but now have many supporting churches. There are 6 houses on 14 acres and staff seek to give emotional, physical, academic and spiritual help.

Pray for new partners and more funds, favor with Mexican government officials and patience for the house parents.

Sandra Arvold is on the board and visits each winter.

The Birth of Mother's Day

Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) loved her mother dearly. It was Miss Jarvis who first suggested a national day to honor all mothers. At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Anna gave a carnation, her mother's favorite flower, to each person in attendance. Within a few years, the idea to honor mothers gained popularity, and Mother's Day was soon observed annually in many large cities of the United States.

On May 9, 1914, by an act of congress, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May as Mother's Day. He established the day as a time for "public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country." By then, it had become customary to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living. The custom continues to this day.

Look Ahead "The spirit of complaint is born out of an unwillingness to trust God with today," says Priscilla Shirer. "Like the Israelites, it means you are spending your time looking back toward Egypt or wishing for the future, all the while missing what God is doing right now."
